




Madison County's age distribution has remained fairly constant for all age groups from 2009 to 2017. About one half of the population is between 18 to 44 years of age, indicating a stable workforce. Similarly, to other counties, the age group of 65+ years has increase 14% from 2009 to 2017.

Net Migration Flows


In 2014, over 1400 people were moving in to Madison County. From 2015 to 2016, the number of people moving to Madison decreased significantly, and in 2016 201 people moved out of the county.

Employment

Key Industries

Madison's top five industries are Health Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade, Manufacturing, Accommodation & Food Services, and Educational Services. These industries employ the largest percentage of the workforce in the county. However, some industries that have experienced a positive growth in the workforce that are not included in the top five are Real Estate & Rental Leasing and Wholesale Trade. From 2013 to 2017, the number of people working in the Health Care and Social Assistance increased by 10% and 11%, respectively.



Location Quotients

A location quotient shows the industry's share of an area's employment relative to the national average. For example, a location quotient of 2.0 indicates that an industry accounts for twice the share of employment in the area than it does nationally, and a location quotient of 0.5 indicates the area's share of employment in the industry is half the national share.

Education

As of 2017, 54.5% of the population over 25 years of age had some sort of college degree.

From 2009 to 2017, the percentage of people over 25 years of age having a bachelor's degree increased from 19.5% to 25%, respectively.

Other education levels did not see such high increase in percentage points in the last years.


While the population over 25 years of age with only a high school diploma or less is decreasing, more people are working towards some sort of college degree, showing a shift towards higher education.


HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES

The high school graduation rates from 2014 to 2018 were calculated by doing a weighted average of the graduation rates for the school districts in Madison County.

Graduation rates increased from 86% to almost 91% from 2014 to 2018.







Income Per Capita

From 2007 to 2017, income per capita in Madison County has grown by 40% at an average rate of 3.5% per year.

Median Household Income

As of 2017, half of the population earned an annual income above \$33.620 and the other half earned an annual income below \$33,620. This number has decreased by 5.2% since 2010. Madison County's median household income is decreasing at an average rate of 0.7% per year, and it is lower than the state's and the nation's.

Poverty Level

The poverty level in Madison County has increased slightly from 2012 to 2017 from 14.3% to 16.2%, respectively.

In 2015, the percent of people under the poverty level reached its highest to 17.6%. The weighted average for people living under the poverty level from 2012 to 2017 is 15.8%.




Living Wage


