



FREMONT'S POPULATION HAS INCREASED ON AVERAGE BY 0.42% OVER THE LAST DECADE. IN 2012, THE ANNUAL POPULATION GROWTH STARTED TO INCREASE REACHING 1.6% IN 2017 AND DROPPING TO 0.57% IN 2018.



Age Distribution

Fremont's county has a younger population that has been increasing in the last decade. People under 18 years old and between 18 and 24 years of age increased by 3.7 and .07 percentage points respectively. In contrast with most counties in Eastern Idaho, the population 65 years old and over has decreased by 4 percentage points from 2009 to 2017.

Net Migration Flows

Migration to Fremont County has been negative from 2009 to 2016. However, from 2013 to

2016, the number of people leaving started to decrease, and in 2016 about 25 people moved in to the area.


Employment

Key Industries

Fremont's top five industries are Educational Services, Retail Trade, Construction, Health Care and Social Assistance, and Agriculture. These industries employ the largest percentage of the workforce in the county. However, some industries that have experienced a positive growth in the workforce that are not included in the top five are Professional and Scientific Services, and Other Services except Public Administration.

Health care decreased by 1 percentage point and education increased by 1 percentage point. From 2013 to 2017, the number of people working in Educational Services has increased by 2.63%. However, that industry experienced a 16% downturn from 2016 to 2017.



Location Quotients

A location quotient shows the industry share of an area's employment relative to the national average. For example, Natural Resources and Mining is the most concentrated industry in the county compared to the nation. However, since 1990 it has been decreasing its level of concentration going from 14 times more concentrated than the nation to 5 times more concentrated than the nation. Trade, Transportation, and Utilities is the industry that is equally as concentrated than the nation. Manufacturing is 3 times more concentrated than the nation has been increasing since 1990.

Education

From 2009 to 2017, the percentage of people 25 years old and over getting a Graduate or Professional Degree in Fremont County has increased from 4.9% to 6.2%, respectively.


Similarly, people 25 years and older who are getting a high school diploma has increased by 4 percentage points in the same time period.


The percentage of people getting an Associate's or a Bachelor's degree has remained fairly constant from 2009-2017.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES

Graduation rates stayed over 90% from the school years 2014-2015 to 2016-17. However, in the school year 2017-2018 the high school graduation rate for Fremont County dropped to 86.6%.







Income Per Capita

From 2007 to 2017, income per capita in Fremont County increased from \$24,051 to \$35,638.

Median Household Income

As of 2017, half of the population earned an annual income above \$51,806 and the other half earned an annual income below \$51,806. This number has grown by 21.8% since 2010. Fremont County's median household income is growing at an average rate of 2.9% per year, but it is lower than the median household income for the state and the nation.

Unemployment Rate



Median Home Value County State National


Median Home Value
