




Power County's age distribution has remained fairly constant for all age groups from 2009 to 2017. About one third of the population is between 18 to 44 years of age, indicating a stable workforce. Similarly, to other counties, the age group of 65+ years increased 35% from 2009 to 2017.

#### **Net Migration Flows**

In 2009, 5 people were moving in to Power County. That number decreased significantly. In 2016, 498 people moved out of the county.


# **Employment**

## **Key Industries**

Power County's top five industries are Health
Care and Social Assistance, Retail Trade,
Manufacturing, Educational Services, and
Agriculture, Forestry, Fishing & Hunting. These
industries employ the largest percentage of
the workforce in the county. However, some
industries that have experienced a positive
growth in the workforce that are not included in
the top five are Administrative & Support & Waste
Management Services and Other Services Except
Public Administration.

From 2013 to 2017, the number of people working in the Educational Services industry have increased by 9%.



### **Location Quotients**

A location quotient shows the industry's share of an area's employment relative to the national average. For example, a location quotient of 2.0 indicates that an industry accounts for twice the share of employment in the area than it does nationally, and a location quotient of 0.5 indicates the area's share of employment in the industry is half the national share.



# Education

As of 2017, 22.6% of the population over 25 years of age had some sort of college degree.

From 2009 to 2017, the percentage of people over 25 years of age having a bachelor's degree decreased from 14.7% to 10.8%, respectively.


There has been a shift of people just earning high school diplomas.


## HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATES

The high school graduation rates from 2014 to 2018 were calculated by doing a weighted average of the graduation rates for the school districts in Power County.

Graduation rates increased from 83.85% to 87.18% from 2014 to 2017.







## **Income Per Capita**

From 2007 to 2017, income per capita in Power County has grown by 29% at an average rate of 2.7% per year.

#### **Median Household Income**

As of 2017, half of the population earned an annual income above \$45,922 and the other half earned an annual income below \$45,922. This number has grown by 16.1% since 2010. Power County's median household income is growing at an average rate of 2.3% per year. It is lower than the state's and nation's.

## **Poverty Level**

The poverty level in Power County has decreased slightly from 2012 to 2017 from 12.5% to 11.6%, respectively.

In 2013, the percent of people under the poverty level reached its highest to 13.9%. The weighted average for people living under the poverty level from 2012 to 2017 is 12.9%.

#### **Unemployment Rate**

The unemployment rate for Power County is lower than the unemployment rate for the nation, but it is higher than the one for the region and the state. There was a peak in 2010-2011. The 2018 unemployment rate for Power County was 2.9%.




#### **Living Wage**

#### **Median Home Value**


